

AMERICANS OPPOSE EV MANDATES AND GAS CAR BANS – AN OBJECT LESSON FOR OUR NATION'S LEADERS

Virginia's election cycle, and the public outcry over EV mandates, shows policies that limit choice and pick winners and losers in our auto market is a losing issue in 2024 and beyond.





In the recent 2023 election cycle several high-profile issues motivated Virginia voters. But one issue that was flying under the radar for many in the Commonwealth was the implications of the Virginia Clean Cars Law. Passed expeditiously in 2021, the law requires that roughly 35% of new vehicles sold in the state must be fully electric beginning in January 2024, and then ramping up to 100% all-electric by 2035. Also known as an internal combustion engine (ICE) ban, California regulators originally developed this policy and it was later adopted by Virginia.

The Specialty Equipment Market Association (SEMA) – a trade association that represents a diverse group of manufacturers, distributors, retailers, publishing companies, auto restorers, street-rod builders, restylers, car clubs, race teams and more – knew someone needed to take charge and educate voters on how this election was the perfect time to hold Virginia lawmakers accountable on a law that was rushed through a partisan legislative process. Internal polling conducted in December 2022 showed high unawareness of this issue. Eighty-one (81) percent of Virginia voters had heard little or nothing at all about the ban. The same poll showed that once voters learned of the ban, 62% of voters opposed it.

Ultimately, our campaign to educate voters significantly elevated the issue of the EV mandate ahead of election day. We saw a tremendous groundswell of opposition to this policy – from both thought leaders and the public – showcasing that Americans want the freedom to choose what they drive.

And now, the <u>federal government</u> also wants to force two-thirds of new cars and a quarter of trucks to be electric vehicles (EVs) by 2032. Given the public outcry by Virginia voters, the Biden Administration should take this as a lesson that Americans are not in favor of government mandates forcing the phase out gas-powered vehicles. A separate poll commissioned by SEMA in April 2023 showed that 67% of voters nationally opposed California's ban on gas-powered cars and trucks.

Driving Force Action conducted a short IVR poll in mid-October to test awareness of Virginia's attachment to California's law to ban the sale of new gas-powered cars, following six weeks of education in the four senate district races DFA targeted. There was a significant increase in awareness with only 16% of Republican and 12% of Independent voters unaware of the issue. This poll also showed that a majority of Republican and Independent voters would support a candidate if they supported the repeal of Virginia's ICE-ban law.

Voters acknowledged that prioritizing the green agenda of California's unelected bureaucrats and a select few politicians over the jobs and livelihoods of millions who use cars every day was not something we should pursue.

The campaign garnered over 13.5 million impressions across four major social networks in just a short, eightweek period.

Lessons Learned

Our campaign mobilized constituencies of all types and emphasized the need for our nation's leaders to reverse track on government mandates that remove your right to decide what kind of car you drive.

One key race that was clearly influenced in this cycle was District 24, where candidate Sheriff Danny Diggs overtook the incumbent Senator Monty Mason, a staunch supporter of the ICE ban policy and the deciding vote to block the repeal of Virginia's ICE ban law. Other notable shifts were in District 17 where Emily Brewer defeated Clinton Jenkins, and District 27 where Tara Durant upset Joel Griffin; the candidates who won committed to repeal the EV mandate. SEMA's "Driving Force Action" campaign was heavily active in educating voters about the EV mandate in these districts.

Glenn Youngkin's Plan to Save Gas Cars

"...the House of Delegates passed a repeal bill, but Democratic state Sen. Monty Mason blocked it from getting out of his committee. At the moment Democrats hold a narrow majority in the Senate, and Mr. Mason is running for re-election in a competitive district..."

Of note, two of these districts were considered toss-up or lean Democrat districts: District 17 (Brewer) favored Democrats by three points, and District 24 (Diggs) showed no party advantage in the electorate going into the election season.

There is an important lesson for the Biden administration and the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) as they consider a similar federal ICE ban. Clearly, segments of the country are not in favor of a mandate that phases out gas-powered cars.

Our plan is to continue to keep pressure on our elected members on both sides of the aisle and urge them to reevaluate California's gas car ban in various states and nationally.
